Built in 1979, Eleanor Allen boasts classic lines and characteristics that surely stole the hearts of her new owners. Her interior however was ready for a complete makeover, to achieve the comfortable feel and practical features her owners required. The extensive interior refit project was entrusted to experienced refit shipyard Arredamenti Porto in Genoa.

In the autumn of 2009 Eleanor Allen, a 31 year old classic canoe stern Feadship motoryacht, came to the dock of Arredamenti Porto. The yacht had just been sold to an American owner who wanted to give her a more contemporary and finished interior look as she was really showing her age internally. Interior work being a specialty of Arredamenti Porto, the company was chosen as the perfect place to turn to for the installation of a new interior; within a nine-month period the interior of the lower and main deck had to be newly designed, constructed and reinstalled.

Atmosphere Overhaul

The exterior of the yacht was generally in good order, however, some exterior work had to be carried out too, including external metal works in line with the expectations of a yacht of this age. Not only was the interior in need of updating, but the layout no longer suited modern requirements for a yacht of her size. Possibly the most unusual work needed was to remove the old car garage in the stern. Eleanor Allen must have been one of very few yachts of her age to carry a car; even if it was only a Mini Moke. The car-lift was removed, as were the ramps and large hatch, replacing these with a smaller hatch and stairs down to a lazarette space which needed sorting with shelves and layout.

The owners entrusted the yacht into the hands of well known designer Michael Kirschstein of Kirschstein Designs Ltd (MKD), as well as to close family friend and interior decorator, Julie Neupert, who was already very familiar with their interior tastes and style of living. The owners worked closely with these two designers and Arredamenti Porto to create a cosy atmosphere with a combination of subtle fabric colours, a warm mahogany interior and two types of Emperador marble with khaki and light emerald hues. This created the inviting and modern new interior desired by the owners family.

Clever Master

In the original owner's cabin the bed was situated forward with a TV on the aft wall bounded by wardrobes with an adjacent bathroom towards the stern. This type of layout meant that the cabin had massive floor space but very little usable space. To solve this, the owner's cabin was completely demolished and then re-partitioned to MKD design. This moved the bed from its original position forwards to port, to a central position on the new aft bulkhead. In this position the new king size bed has been raised to give a full 270° view out through no less than nine windows; six large oblong windows split into three each side and three large circular portholes facing forwards.

The original bed position forwards had covered, to some extent, the step in the deck which allowed for greater headroom in the crew quarters below, and made use of this classic yacht's shear. In the new design this step in the structure of the yacht is covered by the addition of full height cupboards on either side and a large sofa and side tables creating a love seat or day bed on which to lounge or read a book. At the end of the bed, a cabinet contains a large pop-up TV which either serves the bed, or can be remotely rotated to face the day bed below the forward facing circular portholes.

The owner's bathroom was completely dismantled and re-built in such a manner that it allows for a separate shower and bathtub area with double sinks and separate toilet area; all fitted out in the two shades of Emperador marble with mahogany accents to complement the rest of the owner's cabin.

Within this area MKD found enough space to create a dressing table. The re-designing of the partitions in the owner's cabin by Michael Kirschstein also allowed for the creation of a walkin-wardrobe area which simultaneously acts as a lobby to this cabin.

Down Below

The original layout for the guest area consisted of a VIP cabin with en suite bathroom and two other guest cabins; one with full size bed and the other with two twin beds sharing one bathroom plus a day head to be used for all the lower deck cabins.



The size of the old car garage aft reduced the total length of the VIP cabin to such an extent that passing between the end of the bed and the forward wall of the cabin was a squeeze.

Michael Kirschstein's designs included a completely new interior layout for the lower deck guest area, giving each cabin its own en suite bathroom without compromising on space or comfort. This was done by rearranging the walls to create the maximum amount of workable floor space while moving as few of the major structural elements as possible. These structural pillars were encased by the new walls and insulated to ensure minimum noise transfer between cabins.

Upgrade

Once the old interior of the guest area was removed, a warm mahogany interior was installed including new wardrobes, built-in bed frames and new accent pieces. The bed side tables were topped with Emperador marble with pull-out writing surfaces and drawers below. Three new bathrooms were all created in a combination of light and dark marble and mahogany cabinets. Large Corian lined showers with marble floor drains and seats into the hull form were constructed, accompanied by glass doors and a panelled wall to make the most of the available natural light and space. The entire toilet system was replaced and upgraded to reduce noise and increase efficiency. Full height upholstered headboards were created to add style and generate visual head height.



The ceilings were covered with Majilite Destiny Parchment, with a padded backing to reduce noise, and the carpet was also laid on Cloud 9 underlay to reduce noise and vibration. Modern systems were installed within the new joinery, resulting in very comfortable and light cabins.


Opening Up

The main salon and dining room area had two structural pillars encased by the joinery, used to visually separate the two spaces and leaving them fairly dark. This was not assisted by the use of hard wood floors which extended over the rest of the interior of the yacht giving too much of a hard, dark feel for the new owners. The galley and lobby area were also in need of a 'face lift' as they had been well used. The existing appliances were old and needed repositioning to make the galley easier to efficiently work in. 
